

### The Essence of the Gospel



As we start a new year, it is appropriate that we begin with a reflection on the Daughters of the Holy Cross' commitment to evangelism. As we read the New Testament, we see the apostolic priority to bring the gospel to our world. The Apos-

tle Paul writes in Romans:

...if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes and is justified, and with the mouth one confesses and is saved. For the Scripture says, "Everyone who believes in him will not be put to shame." For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; for the same Lord is Lord of all, bestowing his riches on all who call on him. For "everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved."

#### Romans 10:9-13

This passage comes in the middle of a larger section of Paul's letter (chapters 9,10 &11) where Paul is grappling and grieving his own nation Israel's rejection of the gospel— this righteousness that comes by faith and not by the law. Paul says he would cut himself off from Christ, he would forfeit his own salvation, if only Israel would embrace the good news of God's reconciling love in Christ Jesus.

Paul crystalizes the essence of the gospel.

First and foremost, **it is about Jesus**. It is about his Lordship—"if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord...." He is supreme and sovereign over all, and God has vindicated his life and death on the cross through the resurrection. He is the centerpiece of the good news!

Secondly, this gospel is a matter of the heart. "For it is with the heart one believes," says the apostle. Archbishop Thomas Cranmer understood this so well, as reflected in the Collect for Purity which he crafted for our worship: "Almighty God, to you all hearts are open...cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit...." The Christian life is an "inside job" which is dependent on the Spirit's work in our heart. We cannot merely convince or persuade someone of the truth of the gospel apart from the work of the Holy Spirit in a person's heart.

Thirdly, the gospel of Jesus Christ levels the playing field. Paul says, "there is no distinction between Jew and Greek, for the same Lord is Lord of all." This is because now, in Christ, "everyone who believes will not be put to shame." The gospel both exposes our shame and sets us free from our shame. The field is level because we are all in the same predicament...destined for shame. And the field is level because each and every one of us can be set free from that shame by believing in the person and work of Jesus. Indeed, the ground is level at the foot of the cross.

#### **Our Rule of Life**



Happy New Year! A new year brings new hope and a fresh start. Many people make New Year's resolutions but very few actually keep them – only about 9%. Research shows that 23% of people quit by the end of the first week, 64% after the first month. Those aren't very promising statistics and don't seem to bring much hope for success. What if

instead of starting something new – making a new resolution, what if this year we re-upped a commitment we have already made? What if all 1000+ Daughters reviewed and revised their Rule of Life - prayer, study, service and evangelism? Can you imagine the impact we would have on ourselves and those around us? Many of us wrote our Rule of Life when we became a Daughter and for some that may have been more than 11 years ago.

Our Candidate Study Manual says, "It gives us a path forward to a more fruitful Christian life. Following our Rule makes us able to receive what God in His mercy seeks to give us." Imagine us being open to receive what God seeks to give us and how we can bless others with what He gives us. Our Candidate Study Manual goes on to describe a Rule of Life in this way:

A Rule of Life is a list of spiritual disciplines that bring the various aspects of life into an increasingly intentional consideration of our Lord's will and direction for our lives. It is not a spiritual wish list but a realistic, attainable standard of what can be done. Each Daughter's Rule reflects the realities of her own life. It should be carefully and prayerfully developed and reviewed; it can be revised as she grows. By slowly adding disciplines, her Rule provides the path forward for perfecting holiness as Scripture exhorts us to do (2 Cor. 7:1).

As Daughters we don't need to make a New Year's resolution, we need to live more fully into our Rule of Life. We don't have to do it on our own – we do it through the power of the Holy Spirit and in community with other Daughters. Because we are not relying on our own strength or will power, our chance of success is much greater. Please take some time this month to review your Rule of Life. If you can't find your original one, write a new one. It should be done prayerfully with the guidance of the Holy Spirit. One thing to keep in mind is that your Rule of Life should contain the things you already do in regard to prayer, study, service and evangelism but it also should include realistic ways for you to stretch and grow in each of these areas. If you need guidance writing your Rule of Life you can find the Candidate Study Manual on the website.

"We are called to live radically different from the world. Our lives will be transformed by the power of the Holy Spirit as we gaze upon and yield our lives to Jesus Christ, our perfect example." Let's live into what we have already committed to do in 2023 and see what the Lord has in store for us – what a joy to be doing this together with our sisters in Christ!

#### He's Got the Whole World in His Hands



## **Important Changes Concerning Dues**

Happy New Year! As this issue of *The Holy Cross* is going to print before fiscal year end, the fourth quarter Profit & Loss statement may be found on the Daughter's website under the News tab by mid-January.

Thanks to your faithfulness in paying annual dues, we currently have received dues from 76% of our members. If you've not yet had the opportunity to mail your dues in, or if your chapter did not receive their dues statement, please email me at <a href="mailto:sshightx@gmail.com">sshightx@gmail.com</a> so that I might send you another dues statement. Over the next month, I will be sending out communication to those individuals and chapters that we've yet to receive dues from.

At the last Provincial Council meeting, several decisions were made regarding annual dues and enrollment fees.

Effective January 1, 2023, changes for new members include:

- 1. The combined enrollment fee/new members' dues have been reduced from \$85 to \$75. The revised Application for Membership form may be found on the website, under Resources, then Forms.
- 2. In the past, if women were installed after July 1, they would not pay dues the following year. Going forward, all new members will pay \$75, regardless of their installation date, and then pay annual dues (currently \$40) in January of the following year.

Since The Order operates on a calendar fiscal year, our finance chair recommended we collect dues in the year they are earmarked for. We will send out dues statement in the fourth quarter of 2023 for 2024 dues. Dues are to be paid each year by January 31 instead of October 1.

Please make sure you are using the forms found on the Daughters' website. These forms will always be the most current. Remember, if you are sending money, it goes to the Provincial Treasurer!

The funds enabled Trish to travel with other All Saints parishioners to the Diocese of Kibungo to help build a church school. I am happy to share a letter and picture from Trish regarding her mission trip. It is such a blessing to see the ICA donations put to good work in the Lord's kingdom. Below is her report and an expression of thanks to the Order ~ Linda DaSilva

#### Dear Daughters and Sisters in Christ,

The parishioners of the Diocese of Kibungo are so appreciative of all they receive and are wonderful and industrious stewards of all offerings they get.

It is such a joy to see such enthusiasm for Christ and happiness in worship. We witnessed at least 200 people confirmed in their faith by Bishop Emmanuel Ntazinda. All received three books: a Book of Common Prayer, a Hymnal, and a Bible.

The Rwandan people are skilled workers with brick, mortar, and stone. Our group of four did our best to pass bricks and water, mortar and stone, and let them do what they have knowledge of. One lesson I learned from watching them work is that it is a good metaphor for mission work. Try to fill a need, but not to try to change the local culture. To give and step back and watch trusted people create what works in their world and the way they give glory to God.

Thank you for all the support and generosity you have extended to me. Since the diocese was generous in our care, I was able to donate \$200 [to the project] in The Order of the Daughters of the Holy Cross'

name. These funds went very far towards putting glass windows in the church we plastered.

When a woman came forward to accept Christ as her Lord and Savior, the Bishop allowed me to give her a gift of \$20 in the Order's name so that she could know that we are all sisters in the love of Jesus.

I will never forget this remarkable experience and hope to be of help again in the future.

Finally, we can see that **the gospel demands a response**. Paul writes, "everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved." The response God desires from us is not better performance, but that we simply come to him, call on him, even cry out to him. This is the first and continual step of enjoying the riches he desires to pour out upon us, this lifegiving relationship with him.

It's no wonder that, earlier in this epistle, Paul was able to say that he was "not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God unto salvation for everyone who believes." This is the very treasure the Lord has entrusted to us as his children, ambassadors and ministers. May he give us grace to steward well the riches of the gospel of Jesus Christ in this new year.



The St. Helena Chapter at Christ Church Anglican in Midland TX is blessed to support the Midland Adult and Teen Challenge Center (TC). Adult and Teen Challenge provides Christian, faith-based residential care to young people and adults who struggle with life-controlling problems. The program is typically 12- 14 months long and consists of individual and group Biblical Studies, work projects, and education. During the year, Christ Church partners with the TC through monthly healing prayer services, fellowship dinners for graduates, providing work for the men and women enrolled in the program, and offering one on one mentoring. Since 2020, the Daughters of the St. Helena chapter have chosen, as our service project, to support and thank the women's center by providing a Christmas dinner celebration. Starting in October, our chapter collects contributions for gift cards to present to the women so that they may purchase Christmas gifts for their loved ones. At our meetings, we plan the evening, and separate into teams for cooking, welcoming, decorating, etc. On December 4, the women and staff of TC were wel-

comed with Wassail and fellowship, followed by a

formal dinner. The evening then continues as the

congregation joins with the ladies and DHC chapter

for a Christmas program, which consists of a holiday
